Dear Prime Minister,

I am the Chairman of the Royal Society of St. George; England's premier patriotic society. The Royal Society of St. George, founded in 1894, embraces 130 branches in England and around the world, and has many thousands of members. We also have our own Journal and website which should exceed fifty thousand viewers this year.

The principal aims of the Society, of which Her Majesty the Queen is Patron, are enshrined in the Society's charter. They include:

- Respect for the Monarchy, Duty to our Sovereign and Country.
- To further the cause of England and Englishness.
- To foster the love of England and the Commonwealth.
- To keep fresh the memory of those who have served England or the Commonwealth.
- To combat all activities likely to undermine the strength of England or the Commonwealth.
- To further English interests everywhere to ensure that St. George's Day is properly celebrated.

Since your election as Prime Minister, many of our members have requested that I contact you regarding some of their concerns and I should be grateful to receive your answers to the following questions:

1. Prior to your election as Prime Minister, you stated that England should have its own Minister to look after English issues, just as Scotland and Wales do.

When is this to happen?

2. St. George's Day could and should become a National Holiday, possibly replacing the May Day Bank Holiday all the easier to justify since it is also Shakespeare's birthday.

What is your position on this?

3. As we are all part of the United Kingdom - why do the Welsh and the Scots have benefits, including, but not limited to, those in Healthcare and University Education which we, in England, do not? This is unfair on the English as through their taxes they 'support' these other nations of the Union; the unfairness of it creates resentment and ultimately division.

What plans do you have to bring parity between the nations of the United Kingdom on these plus other such issues?

I now await your reply and hopefully you will not object to me publishing this letter on our website and in our Journal for our members to read. We will also post your comments when we receive them.
